We started the year welcoming 140 Year 7 students from 28 different primary schools to high school. #### Attendance:

Friday the 21st of June marked the Winter Solstice as the shortest day in the year and the fresh mornings mean we all find it a little bit harder to get out of bed. Regular attendance has continued to drop off to 76.6% for the 9's and 74.7% for the 10's. Please continue to reinforce the importance the regular attendance at school. It is the single greatest factor in improving academic outcomes for students. Please continue to keep in regular contact with Student Services if your child is planning on being away from school for any reason.

#### **Semester One Reports:**

In relation to academic outcomes, reports hit email inboxes in the next week this is the time of year where you can sit with your child and reflect on their academic progress as well as their attitudes and efforts toward learning, their teachers and peers. Reflecting on academic performance involves taking stock of your achievements, identifying areas for improvement, and setting goals for future academic endeavours. For the year 9's and 10's these are some questions worth considering to help guide this discussion:

- What were the goals your child set for themself for this semester? Did they meet them?
- Which subjects did they do well in? Why do they think they did well in those areas?
- What subjects did they find challenging and why?
- Has your child asked their teachers for feedback on areas they could improve in?
- Based on their reports what specific areas of improvement does your child need to focus on?

Reflecting on a student's academic performance is not just about acknowledging achievements or shortcomings but also about learning from their experiences to become a more effective and successful student. We recognise at WCHS that this is a continuous process that requires a positive partnership between parents the student and school. As part of this support there will be some reshuffling of classes given Year 10's are finished with course counselling, we have also welcomed a number of new Year 9's into our community this term.

Finally, it has been a long term and I hope the Year 9's and 10's has a safe well-deserved break and come back refreshed and refocused for Semester 2.

## YEAR 11 AND 12 NEWS

#### **Senior School**

#### Year 12

Our Year 12s started off strong when they faced down the Externally Set Tasks (EST) for each of their General courses in Weeks 4, 5 and 6. The ESTs are a 50 minute in-class assessment designed by the School and Curriculum Standards Authority (SCSA). They are administered by the school and worth 15% of the grade in Year 12. The students demonstrated fantastic resilience and are to be commended for the studious way they approached these assessments. Similarly, our Year 12 ATAR students undertook their mid-year exams during Week 7. This is the third time these students have sat for ATAR exams, so the mood in the room beforehand was quite relaxed with students quietly reviewing notes and flash cards. Only one more mock exam period to go before the WACE exams at the end of the year!

The Year 12 Valedictory Ceremony is being carefully planned with notices due to come out early next term. For now, please be sure to Save the Date – Wednesday the 23rd of October.

#### Year 11

Our Year 11s have had a productive term so far. Our ATAR students participated in their first week of ATAR exams recently, which is always a daunting experience. Fortunately, our teachers worked hard to support the students in the lead up to the exams, which minimised nerves as much as possible. Our General students also undertook major assessments in Week 8 as grades for Semester 1 reporting began to be finalised. At this time of year it is common for students to appear at my door a little frazzled. To support them through this, I will spend some time with them looking at the bigger picture by examining how they are travelling in all their courses and what their progress towards the WA Certificate of Education looks like. I have seen many students leave my office sighing with relief as they realised they were progressing better than they thought.

Several Year 11 students participated in WorkPlace Learning recently and returned with glowing reviews from their host employers! Workplace learning offers great exposure to different industries and future pathways with the added bonus that every 55 hours of workplace learning can be used towards WA Certificate of Education achievement. ## ADVENTURE RECREATION NEWS

Warnbro Community High School's Adventure Recreation Program is an immersive and dynamic program designed to develop students' outdoor skills, teamwork, and leadership. Through a variety of activities tailored to different year levels, students gain hands-on experience that extends beyond the classroom. Here's an overview of the engaging activities undertaken by students this semester.

## Year 7 Students: Embracing the Great Outdoors Surfing Day Trip

## **CAREERS NEWS**

This term has been a busy term in our careers area, with excursions, incursion, and the subject selection process in Year 10.

In Year 9 careers students have continued discovering the different employability skills employers look for in the work force including teamwork, organisation, and communication skills. Students have recently started writing their Individual Pathway Plans. These plans help students to explore, reflect, identify and evaluate the learning and work pathways available.

In Year 10 careers students have continued the subject selection process. This has included presentations on the different pathways available at WCHS and presentations from our Heads of Learning Areas about the subjects offered to them in Year 11 and 12. Parents and students will now meet with course counsellors on our course counselling night in Week 10 to finalise their courses for 2025.

#### **ABCN**

In Week 8 a group of Year 9 and 10 students attended a workshop with one of our partners on finding their purpose at the State Library. Students spent the day finding out about the values and strengths they had, and which careers could align with these.

Students developed questions and potential lines of inquiry to find out more about potential career opportunities they could peruse. They were helped along the way by a group of wonderful mentors from American Express.

## **Careers Expo**

Our Year 12 General Careers students have been working hard on developing a Careers Expo display for one of their assessment pieces in class. On Tuesday Week 10, students presented these displays to several Year 8 HASS classes. These displays needed to include careers pathways, skills, attributes, and where they could get further information on the career. Students also took part in an interactive activity that represented their career. Careers and industries on display included fashion designer, chef, mining, childcare, electrical, construction, mechanic and many more.


#### **Industry Links**




## **POSITIVE SCHOOL CULTURE - PERMA**

Our moral purpose at WCHS is "to make a positive difference to the lives of young people." We are committed to this by developing a consistent, responsive, inclusive, and safe learning environment.

At WCHS to promote positive school culture we use the PERMA Model of positive psychology which represents the five elements of happiness and well-being. PERMA stands for Positive Emotion, Engagement, Relationships, Meaning, and Accomplishments.
